Stories from around our CPPS world

From San Raymundo, Guatemala

Again this year the girls who attend Holy Mary of the most Precious Blood School planted our extra land space in corn. We were really blessed as our corn production supplied enough to feed our girls and neighbors at least 10 times. When the girls went home after graduation the neighbor children feasted on a whole lot more ears of corn. And another neighbor is presently cutting down the stalks to be fed to his pigs as well as the plants that were left behind after we feasted several times on the quisquil (somewhat like squash hanging in the air) plant that the girls had also planted. If you like fresh garden foods, come on down to Guatemala as we still have carrots, okra, lemon tea spice as well as several other spices and healing plants left.

The students number 28 and neighbors about 25. I shared some of the seed with another neighbor and he also had a great crop.

Our school year goes from Jan.15 to the first week of October. We planted our corn on May 1st, the feast of St. Joseph the worker. We began to harvest in September. I remember we had corn on the cob on the feast of Mary's birth celebration Sept.8th .

Guadalupe Cluster explores *Vocation Culture: Reflection to Action*

On the weekend of Sept. 30-Oct. 1, the members of the Guadalupe Cluster met to discuss Sections I and II of the NRVC's publication titled *Vocation Culture: Reflection to Action*. Using the Contemplative Dialogue Process, we experienced a very rich and in-depth sharing on the topics of "Establishing Boundaries and Clear Identities as Women Religious" and "Increasing the Cultural Knowledge and Sensitivity of our Members." One image that emerged was that **Interculturalism** in our current reality as a Congregation can be seen as an Interstate Highway—each member approaches different entrance ramps at different times at different speeds. We are all hopefully moving in the same direction with the same ultimate goal, that of living our Precious Blood Spirituality as a group of diverse women religious intent on progressing forward to the "One Table." We are in this journey together.



All of our discussions were viewed through the lens of Precious Blood Spirituality. We see Precious Blood Spirituality evident in the ordinariness of daily life. Welcoming, prayerfulness, joy, compassion, and reconciliation were a few of the examples of various values reflecting day-to-day events of members' experiences. Rain and blood flowing in the cracks of a sidewalk after a drive-by murder provided a graphic example of today's society in need of reconciliation.

We concluded that we each need an attitude of openness to imagine our future together, to see needs and to extend our hearts and hands in solidarity to one another and to those whose lives we touch and touch us.



