SMALL GREAT THINGS by Jodi Picoult; **TEARS WE CANNOT STOP: A Sermon to White America** by Michael Eric Dyson.

Small Great Things is a novel of a Black nurse accused by a White Supremist couple of allowing their baby to die. The nurse is defended by a White woman lawyer. The book is insightful on all levels as it takes on racism and discrimination in America today. 
April 4th A.C.T. to End Racism Rally on National Mall

The National Council of Churches (NCC) has announced plans to hold a rally to end racism on the National Mall on April 4. The *A.C.T. to End Racism Rally* is the starting point of a multi-year effort, launched by NCC and friends, to remove racism from the nation's social fabric and bring the country together.

In remembrance of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who inspired and challenged America to confront and put an end to racism, the rally will take place on the day the nation marks 50 years since his assassination.

NCC and its coalition of over 50 partners recognize that the faith community and those of moral conscience have a specific responsibility to address and eliminate racism, but also unique gifts that enable them to do so.



Earth Day April 22, 2018 Campaign

Guatemala

Numerous hills, many volcanoes, lovely flowers and beautiful, gracious people -- that's Guatemala! Sr. Rosemary Goubeaux and I spent six days there, March 6 thru 14, and found it to be a very enriching experience which touched our hearts.

To visit our three community members who live there; namely, Sisters Terry Walter, Joyce Kahle and Marife Hellman, motivated Rosie and I to travel to that country and share our lives and experiences with one another. What a delight it was to see the faces of Terry & Joyce and receive their warm hugs of welcome at the airport in Guatemala City. Upon arrival at their home, the six young women who live with them also welcomed us with such a joyful, caring spirit.

The next morning Terry drove their car and took Rosie and I to San Raymundo, about an hour and a half drive into the hilly countryside, to see Marife and Holy Mary of the Most Precious Blood School (*Escuela Santa Maria de la Preciosisima Sangre*). She and everyone at her school extended a very hearty welcome.

In the next couple of issues of the **Grassroots** newsletter, we will tell you more about our trip, especially about the ministry involvements of our Sisters. For this issue the focus is on their lovely enclosed yard with an herb garden and patio. In the middle of the garden there is a circle of black rocks. The circle is filled with many different kinds of herbs, which are used primarily in cooking. Along the outer edge of the square space there are lovely palm trees, flowers, and green plants. All of this is so good for our environment.



Joyce faithfully waters and cares for these plants as well as 3 other garden areas. It is a lot of work to maintain these lovely spaces. Once a month a gardener comes to assist her and give good advice and tips for taking care of this great variety of plants. With temperatures in the 70's & 80's, while we visited there, it was a very enjoyable place to relax.

This was the title of LCWR's Imagining Justice Conference that Colleen Kammer attended in Tucson, AZ, March 12 – 14th. The retreat was led by Sr. Gail Worcelo SGM, a former student of Fr. Thomas Berry, C.P., and one of his co-founders of the Green Mountain Monastery in Vermont.

Using the teachings of philosopher and scientist Fr. Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, SJ and Fr. Berry, Sr. Gail helped participants better understand the movement of energy in the universe and how to tap into the energy fields and to manage them in order to attain greater self-enlightenment and to develop a coherence of the heart. From this place of greater wholeness, we can unleash the energies of love to create positive social change and to transform the world.

Sr. Gail led the 50 religious and lay justice promoters through contemplative exercises, mutual awakening activities and personal and shared reflection to support her lessons. Participants enjoyed the sharing and exchange of knowledge about their congregations and ministries.

Sisters Co-Sponsor Anti-Human Trafficking Event in Dayton



The Sisters of the Precious Blood co-sponsored an anti-human trafficking event – “S.O.A.P. UP the First Four” - at Chaminade – Julianne High School (CJ) in Dayton, on Saturday, March 10, along with Abolition Ohio, CJ, the University of Dayton (UD) and S.O.A.P (Save our Adolescents from Prostitution).

Over 60 students and adults participated in the event, the purpose of which was to educate and to provide materials for area hotel staff on human trafficking. This was done prior to the increase in out-of-town visitors to Dayton for the NCAA First Four basketball tournament on March 13 and 14.

Colleen Kammer and sisters Regina Albers, Marita Beumer, Ann Clark, Joan DeChristopher, Patty Kremer and Ceil Taphorn assembled packets of information. Sr. Marita and Colleen delivered the packets to the hotels along with bars of soap that were labeled with

the national trafficking help number.

The event energized two UD students who will co-coordinate a Dayton S.O.A.P. chapter, whereby they will train volunteers for outreach and organize S.O.A.P. activities to provide an avenue to freedom for the enslaved young people in the Dayton area.
